1. Viplava Festival (31st March - 1st April) (ISKCON East of Kailash)

Janaknandini, which is possible only on this auspicious day.


20. Appearance day of Srimati Rukmini Devi (27th April) (ISKCON Dwarka)


22. Art of Teacher-hood Seminar (30th April) (ISKCON Dwarka)

1. Discover Your Permanent Happiness (5th May - 20th May) (ISKCON Dwarka)

A faith booster 7-day session for the newcomers is being organized every Saturday and Sunday of the



month. H.G. Amal Krishna prabhu will conduct the sessions. Amal Krishna Prabhu is a Professor in JNU and has been twice awarded with Young Scientist award by the Government of India.

3. Purushottama Month begins (16th May-13th June) (ISKCON All Delhi-NCR Temples)

The month of Purushottama is named after the Lord Himself. This month has been specially blessed to contain the potency to shower mercy on spiritual seekers. The Lord says in Padma Purana:

"I shall make this poor extra month just like Me in quality, fame, opulence, realization, success, and in giving benediction to the devotees. This month will become equally potent. I am bestowing all of My divine qualities in this abused month. Named after Me, this month will be famous as Purushottama month in this world."

"Oh Garudadhwaja," Lord Sri Krishna continued, "My Goloka is unattainable to the performers of austerities, mahatmas engaged in pious activities, to people who maintain celibacy, or to those who fast their whole life's duration. But just by observing Purushottama month and becoming a devotee one can easily cross over this material ocean and return back to Godhead. Observance of this Purushottama month is the best of all austerities. Just as a farmer produces a rich harvest by planting seeds in nicely cultivated land, so an intelligent man who practices devotional service towards the Supreme Lord in this Purushottama month will enjoy a blissful life while in this world and after leaving his body he will return back to Godhead".

All human beings should perform some devotional service in this Purushottama month by daily:

- Worshipping Me, Sri Krishna, by chanting My holy names
- Study of Srimad Bhagavatam and Bhagavad-gita
- Giving in charity
- Offering ghee dipa (lamp)

The above statement establishes the significance of this month. Devotees celebrate this auspicious month by chanting more, engaging themselves in more spiritual activities. Chapter 15 of Bhagavad-Gita, describing the glorious abode of the Lord, is recited every day. It is a perfect time to experience the nectar of devotional service.



PARENTING PRINCIPLES FROM BHAGAVAD-GITA

In the Bhagavad Gita, Krishna delineates a majestic world view which reveals to us our place and purpose in this world. And interestingly Krishna concludes the Bhagavad-Gita, not with a command, as much as with a call. A command means one must do it, and a call conveys that He's inviting.

So He concludes in 18.63 by saying,

vimṛśyaitadaśeṣeṇa yathecchasitathā kuru

now deliberate on what I have said, and then yathecchasi- as is your desire you do that.



So here we see that although Krishna is God and the Bhagavad-Gita clearly establishes Krishna's divinity, still Krishna does not demand obedience, rather Krishna respects human independence and appeals to human intelligence. The whole Bhagavad-Gita is not a series of dictatorial dictates: "I am God; you do this." No. When Arjuna asks intelligent questions Krishna gives reasonable answers.

In the middle of the Bhagavad-Gita - the 11th chapter, Arjuna himself uses the metaphor of a parent and a child to explicate the relationship between Krishna and himself.

Krishna adopts a parental role, the role of a Guru. Krishna does not dominate and demand, rather He appeals to the intelligence, through enlightenment and encouragement. He tells us what we should do. Not just what should we do but also why should we do it? Along with that His encouragement gives us the confidence that we can do it. Enlightenment without encouragement is alienating. On the other hand if there is only encouragement without enlightenment then there is no upliftment. These two dynamics apply in a parental relationship also. Parents are expected to, on one side offer love to their children, and on the other side offer guidance which also means discipline.

Unfortunately, there are some parents who offer neither love nor discipline. The children live in their world and the parents live in theirs. The parents are watching TV all day or they have their jobs, they go for jobs and come back and children are doing their own thing.

There are some parents who offer love but no discipline. Whereas the first are negligent parents, the second is permissive parenting which is incomplete.

The other is authoritarian, i.e., parenting becomes dictatorial where there is only discipline and no love. Because the children are subordinate to their parents they may obey but when they grow older they just rebel. A huge gap comes between the parents and the children. Because the children feel that they were never loved and were only dominated. Hence, this is authoritarian.

From the Bhagavad-Gita's point of view there is encouragement and enlightenment. When we not only discipline through punishment but also tell why something should be done.

Therefore, the Bhagavad-Gita is not so much a book of Commandments as it is a book of choices. It is a book where we see both choices and consequences. In 18.58 in the Bhagavad-Gita Krishna says,

mac-cittaḥsarva-durgāṇi mat-prasādāttariṣyasi athacettvamahankārān naśroṣyasivinankṣyasi

mac-cittaḥ—"If you become conscious of Me, you will pass over all obstacles by My grace. He is saying if you become conscious of Me, this is the consequence. If you don't do this (athacettvamahaṅkārān), naśroṣyasivinaṅkṣyasi- you will be lost. If you don't become conscious of Me you will be lost. Now it is up to you what you want to do". Thus, Krishna gives us choices but along with choices He tells about the consequences. By telling about the consequences He makes sure that Arjuna can make educated, well-informed choices. In 18.63 Krishna tells Arjuna that he should now deliberate deeply decide what he wants.

Krishna is concerned just like a parent would be and say, 'I told you that why didn't you do it?' No! If you have told and the children have not done it then that means they haven't understood its importance. They haven't understood its necessity. So it's our

responsibility to explain, especially when children get into the teenage years, that adolescence is a turbulent period. So when they don't understand what they are doing, why they are feeling the way they are feeling, why they are acting the way they are acting and when others blame them for acting in that particular way, then children get defensive, rebellious and then the communication between the parents and the children breaks. That is what we call, generation gap. It's not a generation gap, it becomes like a generation valley. Nothing seems to get communicated. Hence, here we must recognize that ultimately how can we influence another person. There are three main ways. One is provide knowledge second is set example, and third is give facilities.



Provide knowledge: If parents want to teach their children how to ride a cycle, they provide knowledge of how you should balance, how it should not make sudden turns, you should not press the brakes suddenly, and you should not paddle too fast. Setting an example: sometimes children are very afraid. If I ride a cycle I will fall down. This is when parents ride a cycle and show that it is not very difficult. And then after that it is not that the parents directly give the cycle and let them go on the highway. They provide the facility, such as a yard somewhere or some other safe zone where they can practice. And by this one can train the child- how to ride a cycle. Riding the cycle is relatively easy, but riding the mind isn't. Normally when we see children growing, we see the biological growth. The changes in the external gross physical body are visible. But along with that the subtle body also changes. So when children are small, they are usually mostly mind and little intelligence.

When children come to their teenage years at that time puberty comes in. The sexual desire awakens and it's a completely new experience and it just makes the mind extremely agitated, biologically hormones start getting secreted in the body and because of this whole new feature of life that is awakening, the emotions become very turbulent. And the intelligence on the other hand usually grows, goes into a mode of



rebellion. Why is that? When the children are small, at that time the parents are almost like God to them. Everything that the children need is provided by the parents. So initially there is this whole conception, maybe it is not consciously articulated because the children are so small, but they think that my parents are perfect in every way. And when they come to the teenage years they gradually start seeing, "oh my parents are not all that perfect!". They also have their problems. They also have their faults. They are like this, they are like that. And unfortunately the culture in the media often exploits this emotional vulnerability of children or of teenagers and manipulates their emotions.

Consequently, we live in a culture that bombards the children with desires. Get this toy, get this watch, get this gadget, get this bike and it is not possible for any parent to satisfy all the desires that are there in the adolescent mind. So even if the parents don't have any faults, just the fact that the parents do not provide the children all that they want becomes the big fault in the eyes of the children. In this way the same mind that had almost considered the parents to be perfect, like God; now it goes to the other extreme and it goes into rebellion, where the children start resenting the parents. 'You don't give methis, you don't give me that'. And it is not just that they have become bad but it is just that the desires have become so turbulent that at that time it is just a biological- psychological phase that one is going through. In childhood knowledge is more caught than taught. Taught means you do this and you don't do this. That's teaching. But caught means you see actions.

The way we act is what influences others much more than how we tell them to act. This IS applicable even more in a vertical relationship where children feel that my parents are controlling me, dominating me, then they try to get back in whatever ways seem practical. Thus, setting an example is extremely important. The children see that the parents are doing what they are talking. They are walking their talk and that inspires them.

And last stage is providing facility. If children are provided spiritual sankskaras, some connection with

God in the form of spiritual music, going to temple, taking darshan, having some exposure to the pastimes of the Lord, Rama Katha or Krishna Katha, then that creates impressions. They may not even understand but these impressions as very valuable. Initially they may just do it because they are being told. Things may change once they attain adolescence because at that time they start asserting their independence. And this asserting independence is both ways; emotionally and intellectually. Emotionally they feel like, 'I want to explore the world, why are you restricting me'. And intellectually they start questioning 'why should I do this? What is the point of it all?' And if the parents at that time give the answer, 'this is our culture that is why you should do it'. That is a very unsatisfactory answer. 'Okay it is your culture, why should I follow your culture? No. I want to live my life.' In fact sometimes if there is too much of a gap between parents and children, then the children reject the parent's culture not because they dislike the culture but because they want to hurt their parents. They want to get back at their parents.

As a result, when they come to the teenage, it is important that the parents set a proper example.

If the parents are studying scriptures, are going to the temple, are themselves being spiritual then that example will inspire them. 'Yes my parents walk the talk'. Otherwise the children see that, 'my parents are just materialistic but when I want to be materialistic in my way they say, No! This is bad, but it is the same thing. You are materialistic in your way and I'm in my way.' So when there is spiritual example along with spiritual impressions, it empowers them to fight against their lower passions.

Also, if the parents want their children to adopt their culture, it is important that they develop a circle of similar age group for their children, which is also spiritual. In this circle, they practice spiritual life in a group, on their own terms and without the imposition of an adult perspective. In a way that makes sense to





them, both to their head and to their heart. And in this way they get the inner strength by which they can fight their lower self.

It is the parent's responsibility to create this kind of facility or to make efforts to provide it. However, when that is done, at the end of it all still we can't control. Krishna says yathecchasitathā kuru 'as you desire so you do'. So though we cannot determine how others will act. But we can do our best in making sure that others can make the right choices.

The culture of questioning and answering in spiritual circles is most exemplarily demonstrated in the Bhagavad-Gita with God Himself answering questions. Nowhere in the Bhagavad-Gita does Krishna say, 'No, don't ask questions. No, I'm God just accept this'. Nowhere does he do that. It is natural that the human mind will come up with questions. If we have ourselves studied the philosophy then we will understand the answers, we can provide answers or if we connect our children with a spiritual forum where they can get the answers, then they can move onwards. When there are questions we need to provide the answers to them and that requires philosophical education. So if we study the philosophy, if we set an example and if we make endeavours to provide facilities, we have done all that we can to help our children to make the right choices. And even if they make some wrong choices for some time but they will have that inner substance to come back on track. That is how the Bhagavad-Gita offers us a model. If we provide facilities, if we set an example and if we provide knowledge then surely in due course we will empower our children to become the best that they can be.

Books by His Divine Grace A.C. Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada


Bhagavad-gita As it is




